Physical Therapists are dynamic health professionals who develop, coordinate and utilize selected knowledge, skills and techniques in planning, organizing and directing programs for the care of individuals whose ability to function is impaired or threatened by disease or injury. Physical Therapists examine, evaluate, diagnose, plan and provide treatment for persons of all ages who have disabilities or changes in physical function or health status resulting from injury, disease and other causes. The goal of physical therapy is to enhance a person's quality of life and ability to participate in activities. Physical Therapists work in a variety of settings with a variety of persons including those with disabilities, acute injuries and illnesses, pain, developmental delay, and elite athletes.

WHY WAYNE STATE UNIVERSITY?

Wayne State University is a premier urban research institution offering more than 370 academic programs through 13 schools and colleges to nearly 28,000 graduate and undergraduate students. The University provides a multidisciplinary approach to research and education, and collaborates closely with government, industry, and other institutions on a range of programs.

The Eugene Applebaum College of Pharmacy and Health Sciences (EACPHS) is located on one of the largest academic medical campuses in the United States and puts you in close proximity to the nation's leading health care educators. A degree from the College puts you in good company, with more than 12,000 EACPHS-educated health care professionals working in Michigan.

The Wayne State University Doctor of Physical Therapy program provides classroom and laboratory facilities with state-of-the-art technology, and a faculty made up of highly skilled clinicians, teachers, researchers and leaders in the profession. The resources of the WSU School of Medicine and the Detroit Medical Center are also available to students through learning, research and service opportunities. Graduates of the program consistently score high on physical therapy license examinations.

HOW DO I APPLY?

The application deadline is **October 15** of each year. The applicant must successfully complete the admission requirements, including application for admission to WSU and the professional program application. Completion of admission requirements does not guarantee an interview or admission into the program.

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

- A minimum of 3.0 overall GPA as calculated by PTCAS, a minimum 3.0 GPA in science and math prerequisite courses, and a minimum 3.0 cumulative GPA in all prerequisites.
- All grades in prerequisite requirements must be a minimum of "C" or better (2.0 on a 4.0 grade scale).
- A minimum of 90 credit hours.
- General Test of the GRE taken by October 15th.
- GRE minimum scores required: 280 combined verbal & quantitative and 3.0 in writing.
- Math and science prerequisite coursework must be completed by December of application year (one can remain to be completed by May). Non-science prerequisites must be completed by May. General Education requirements must be complete before entering the professional program.

* Applicants need two semesters of chemistry; inorganic and organic or biochemistry are recommended. One chemistry course must have a lab.

Math and science requirements must be completed within six years of the time of admission to professional program.
